Daughter donates Silver Star, Purple Heart

A picture is worth a thousand words. In this heart-wrenching photo, the Purple Heart and Silver Star for 2nd Lt. Thomas Boyle is being awarded posthumously to his widow and daughters. Colleen, the oldest daughter, donated these to MOAM in March.

Her father was honorably discharged as a Sergeant First Class from WWII. During the Korean War he was battlefield commissioned a 2nd Lt. He was awarded the Silver Star for extreme bravery and the Purple Heart for being killed in action.

Some (a very few) question the seeming futility of war. But perhaps we should wonder what flag the survivors would live under, had it not been for the sacrifice of our veterans such as Lt. Boyle.

Help Preserve This Place Forever

I'm so thankful that the political primary is over. Perhaps fewer causes are now competing for your giving budget. I would be lax if I didn't remind you of our financial needs. Frequent comments in our comment book state, "This place needs to be preserved forever." The Miracle of America Museum provides an environment for the preservation and presentation of history for all ages. Admissions generate income and help us pay the operational expenses, but to secure our future, our endowment fund must be enlarged by at least \$2 million. For some, that would not be a sacrifice. Another need is for overflow parking. Walmart has allowed us to use the adjoining field next door. That nine acres is for

sale, but the company won't sell us just a one-acre piece which would fill our need as well as allow a driving tour of outside displays. They are asking \$850,000. There are numerous commercial opportunities for the remaining eight acres if a museum friend were to invest in the whole and allow us the one acre.

For every thousand donated, we will give a lifetime pass to a person of your choice. Remember that neither Helen nor I receive any remuneration. Memorials are another way of giving as **Lee and Bonnie Manicke** gave a \$50 gift in memory of Ed Holland. A trust is another way as in the case of the late Donna Rolfson whose estate managed by Mercer Law Office gifted the museum another \$100.
