Currently we are planning a first annual winter activity at the museum offering rides in or on, and demonstrations of several of our winter snow machines. We will hold it snow or not on Saturday January 15, from 9 am to 5 pm. Jennifer at Blacktail Mountain Ski Area says that we should have snow by then.

We would like this to be a winter fund raiser, but we will

honor standard admission of \$5 for ages 2-12; \$10 over 12.

Enjoy hot chocolate and apple cider at a dollar a cup. If any snow sports groups would like to demonstrate or display, please contact Gil ahead of time at 406-883-6804. We also need responsible operators that day as well. Since some of the machines are rather non-traditional, we will give an orientation ahead of time. Safety is of the utmost concern. Pictured are

some of the units we hope to use. Any tips will go toward the non-ethanol premium gas we must use.



Visitors don't seem to tire of seeing many of the rare vehicles they had seen on previous visits. Case in point is the 1929 Oakland Landau Sport Sedan that was beautifully restored by the late Floyd and Ruth Mauth of Missoula and



has been on loan here for over 30 years. The Overland company was taken over by the Pontiac Company. The son, Terry, later inherited the Oakland and liked it here on display, so offered to make an outright donation of half of its appraised value. A gracious donor who wished to remain anonymous helped with one half of the remaining cost, so MOAM now holds the title.

While we are talking about motorized vehicles, two interesting pieces came in last quarter. We might call them the Beauty and the Beast. "Beauty" is a beautifully home built snowmobile, circa mid 1970s by William Weaver. He was a master Electrician at Anaconda Aluminum plant in Col. Falls for 30 years. He was also a master at tinkering and built the

pictured snowmobile using an engine from a generator used in a bomber aircraft, according to the family. He did a professional job and the family used it many times to drag elk out of the woods during hunting season. David got it running.

Pictured beside "Beauty" is the "Beast." It is definitely ugly. Commonly called "Doodlebugs," they were homemade tractors. During the Depression and other hard times, farmers couldn't afford new tractors, so they built them out of parts from piles of scrap iron. This is different from the other two in our collection. It used parts from two different years of Model A Fords, a rear axle and auxiliary transmission from a Model TT Ford truck, and front wheels from a V-8 Ford. It was donated by brother-in-law, Gary Abbey.

"Gilding the Lily" is an archaic phrase implying that artists would use gold paint (gild) to paint a lily which was already considered the most beautiful of all flowers, to try



and make it even more beautiful. I have recently done that by adding a beautiful necklace to our already beautiful school marm in the 1912 Green Mountain School. This necklace was donated to us by **Phyllis Fulkerson** who set up our beauty shop back in the day, but moved to Lake Havasu, AZ several years ago. Her late husband, **Glen**, whose family used to have a dairy near Fulkerson Corner just east of Polson on Hwy 35, donated numerous dairy items now displayed in the dairy barn which miraculously escaped our recent fire.



Among other handyman duties, David has been busy rebuilding a large heavy duty bobsled used for logging. Thanks to Dupuis Lumber on Turtle Lake Road just off Hwy 35 for donating large beams for this project.



Dan Sharp sent us 12 WWII headline newspapers.

Jan Boyle brought in some antique postcards, early Cub and Boy Scout uniforms from the late 50s, and misc. collectibles.

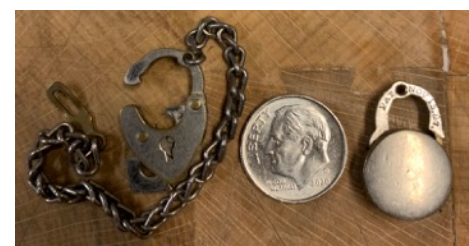
Lee Manicke donated misc. horse tac, pack saddle, spurs, and misc.

Chief picker, **Howard Hudson** keeps finding unique collectibles like the miniature padlocks, pictured at right, one dated 1887, pictured next to a dime for size comparison. He also facilitated the donation of the afore mentioned snowmobile and even delivered it from

Kalispell. He also donated 12 gal of new hydraulic oil which came in handy, because we had to rebuild the lift cylinders on our museum forklift.



James Adley donated a very complete and compact Vietnam War period mine detector. Land mines hidden just below ground took a devastating toll on personnel, vehicles and civilians alike.

Marine Corps veteran **John Miller** is moving out of the area and donated three nice show cases and misc. uniforms, flags, posters, field gear, etc. The famous Christy poster actually had a hidden message. Women were openly joining the Navy starting in 1917, but the message, after attracting the attention of the young men with a beautiful woman, implied that if you are a real man, you'd join the Navy instead of the other branches of service.

Ruth Caudill donated a Boy Scout Signal set to teach Morse Code, WWII newspapers, etc.

Donald Wallace brought in a few historical political pins and a personal letter from President Nixon to his father

Harold Wallace when he was running for congress.

Illa Hilliard and relatives donated three boxes of WWII newspapers, a Navy Air uniform, flight helmets and radio gear.

Did you know this may reduce your taxes?
